Financial Aid Verification & Financial Aid Awards: CHECK YOUR COLLEGE EMAIL ADDRESS AND YOUR COLLEGE STUDENT PORTAL! Please contact me for assistance in submitting financial aid verification paperwork so that you can find out how much each college will cost for you prior to Decision Day. Once you have received financial aid awards, please let me or Mr. Waters know if you need help interpreting the different grants and loans offered. It is NOT too late to submit the FAFSA - FAFSA stands for Free Application for Federal Student Aid. Every senior who is even considering pursuing education after high school should submit the FAFSA as soon as possible. Funds are awarded first come, first served by many colleges. Most students receiving free/reduced lunch will qualify for \$6,195 per year on the spot. Even if you don't get free/reduced lunch you may still receive thousands in state and college aid. FAFSA doesn't look at your grades, doesn't require essays, and doesn't obligate you to take out loans. FAFSA money can be used at 4-year colleges, NOVA, and most career/technical schools. There's no reason not to fill it out!! Mr. Waters and I can help you over email or a zoom meeting.

- If your parent does not have a social security number, it is okay. Only the student must qualify or be eligible to complete the FAFSA. You can enter all zero's-0 for a parent in the social security box if your parent does not have a social security number.

FREE online classes at NOVA this summer for TCW class of 2020 and 2021! Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA) is using institutional dollars from the Federal stimulus to launch a new summer schedule of tuition-free online classes for approximately 70,000 qualified Northern Virginia high school students. This is an opportunity for rising seniors through graduating seniors to JumpStart their summers and earn college credit by attending up to two online courses that will run from June 1 to July 15.

11th GRADE FAMILIES:

Junior College Planning Night- did not happen as planned due to the pandemic and closure of TCW. However, the College and Career Center (Ms. Morris), SFA Advisors (Mr. Waters and Ms. Harrington) and your Counselors are still available to help and support you with the college planning and application process. Stay tuned for the newly updated Junior College Planning Night PowerPoint and Handouts which will be distributed soon. As we learn more about the admission process for the class of 2021, it is becoming clear that letters of recommendation, personal essays and co-curriuclar/extra-curricular activities will play a big role in the admission process.

Changes to AP, SAT and ACT: information is evolving

- <u>SAT & AP Updates (College Board</u>): Updates on SAT testing dates and AP exam info and AP supports for students
- <u>ACT Updates</u>: reschedule your April ACT, access free ACT practice tests and read other updates...scroll down to the "Student & Parent Resources"
- In previous years we recommended that juniors should take the ACT and SAT to compare results and determine whether the SAT or ACT is a better fit for their test-

taking-style. Students could then study and prepare for one test and then retake the test of their choice over the summer or in early fall. *This recommendation may change based on new testing dates and the number of colleges that switch to test optional for the class of 2021.*

- <u>SAT Subject Tests</u>: there are SAT subject test fee waivers to cover the cost of
 the SAT Subject Tests (also called SAT IIs), which are recommended by UVA and other
 <u>similarly selective schools</u>. The SAT Subject Tests are available in specific content areas
 (similar to AP exams). *Typically spring of junior year is an ideal time to take*the SAT Subject Tests because the content is most fresh in student's minds before
 summer break however due to the pandemic the next SAT Subject test is not being
 offered until August 2019.
- SAT and ACT Fee Waivers: students receiving free or reduced lunch may take both the ACT and the SAT for free two times, in addition to the two times the SAT is offered for free at TCW Williams (spring of junior year and fall of senior year). Again, things are evolving as the SAT scheduled for April 14, 2020 for ALL TC Juniors was cancelled.

Have you started to think about your essays and personal statements for your college applications? Now is a good time to begin to working on your college essays. Your essay is not supposed to be a timeline, resume or a general five paragraph expository essay with an introduction and conclusion. Your essay should be personal and should show not tell the reader more about you. REMEMBER that many selective schools and majors require supplemental essays.

 - When seeking out topics for your college essay, you may wonder if writing about the coronavirus pandemic is a wise choice. While it's natural to be focused on COVID-19 and the way it's affecting your life right now, the truth is that many of your fellow applicants are likely to have similar experiences around this topic. The best college essays are unique, and students who write about the virus are unlikely to stand out

Have you started to narrow down your list of colleges - The Scholarship Fund would be happy to talk through your list of potential colleges with you and help you choose 6-8 schools that fit you personally, academically and financially:

- Offer your major of interest: Not sure what you want to study? Take your career and personality assessments in Naviance!
- Match your GPA & SAT/ACT scores (2 safety, 2 match, 2 reach): Take a look at the average GPA and SAT/ACT score for admittance to 4-year public and private colleges in the state of Virginia here, check out the scattergrams in Naviance, and make a free account with Princeton Review.
- Will be affordable for your family: Use the Net Price Calculator to get a personalized price for each college on your list. The Net Price Calculator will take into account your family size, income, and grades and calculate how much your family is eligible for in financial aid and scholarships at that particular school. You'll find that each college has a different starting price (or "sticker price") and will award you a different amount of financial aid. The goal is to make sure that you and your family can afford the schools on your list.

Consider whether you would be a good candidate to apply Early Action/Early Decision or to apply for the Posse, Questbridge, or Gates scholarship - Not sure? I'd be happy to help you evaluate your options. If you think you may be interested, there are steps you should take now to begin your applications before the school year ends. Please keep in mind that EA/ED dates are still the same at last year, but this is subject to change. Stay tuned.

- Early Action/Early Decision: Ivy Leagues and many highly selective colleges accept almost 50% of their freshman class through Early Action/Early Decision. Students who have a 3.75+ GPA and are enrolled in AP/DE courses may want to consider applying early.
 - Early Action (EA): Accepted students are not required to attend EA college
 - Early Decision (ED): Accepted students are required to attend ED college and withdraw all other college applications. Because ED is binding, it is important that students with financial need apply ONLY to colleges that guarantee to meet 100% of the student's financial need (<u>please see this list of colleges that guarantee to meet 100% of financial need</u>). Only families that can afford to pay the full cost of college out of pocket should apply ED to colleges that are not included on the above list.
- <u>Posse</u>: Students with strong leadership experience who have a 3.3+ GPA and are enrolled in AP/DE courses should consider applying to Posse, a 4-year fulltuition scholarship to highly selective partner colleges. Students must be nominated

(counselor, teacher or self-nomination) to apply, and the application process is interview based. Here is a link to the <u>self-nomination form</u>. <u>If you would like to be nominated for Posse or have questions please let me.</u>

- QuestBridge: Students with high financial need (household income of \$65,000 per year or less) who have a 3.75+ GPA and are enrolled in AP/DE courses should consider applying to QuestBridge, a 4-year, full-ride scholarship to highly selective partner colleges. Applications are due in September of senior year.
- <u>Gates</u>: Students with high financial need (Pell-eligible) who have a 3.3+ GPA and are enrolled in AP/DE courses should consider applying to Gates, a highly selective, 4-year, full-ride scholarship for minority high school seniors. Applications are due in September of senior year.

Looking for all-expense paid college visits? - Many colleges sponsor high achieving students from traditionally underrepresented groups, students who are the first generation in their family to attend college, and/or students from families with limited financial resources. Some of these programs are also open to undocumented or DACA students. Participation in these visits often gives you a competitive edge in the admissions process, so check out this sampling of opportunities and contact Mr. Waters or Ms. Harrington to learn more. Several of these programs have not updated their info for 2020 due to the COVID 19 pandemic. There is a chance these programs could be cancelled for 2020/21.

<u>Don't forget to renew FAFSA</u> - Need help submitting your FAFSA for next school year or completing financial aid verification paperwork? You are more than welcome to still reach out for help!

Financial Hardship & Financial Aid Appeals: Few college students know that they can request changes to their college financial aid packages, via an appeal process.

- Is your family facing financial hardship?
- Does your families 2018 income tax return (the tax return you used on your 2020/21 FAFSA), no longer represent your current income/financial situation, due to the COVID 19 pandemic or some other personal crisis?
- If yes, please talk to the Scholarship Fund College Advisors, Ms. Harrington-college@acps.k12.va.us or Mr. We are here to help you. There are ways to appeal to your college and ask them to do an internal recalculation of your Estimated Expected Family Contribution (EFC).

- 11. <u>Cameron Impact Scholarship</u> May 22, 2020 (priority deadline) **CLASS of 2021 students** with strong leadership skills, extensive community service and extracurricular experiences, and 3.7+ unweighted GPA should consider applying to the Cameron Impact Scholarship, a 4-year full-ride, merit-based scholarship
- 12. Alexandria Sportsmen's Club Scholarship-May 22, 2020. \$2,000 scholarship. All applicants must have played at least one season of a Varsity sport and be enrolled as a senior at one of the four Alexandria City, VA high schools: Bishop Ireton High School, Episcopal High School, St. Stephens & St. Agnes School or T.C. Williams High School

Posse May 29, 2020 4-year, full-tuition scholarship to a DC region Posse partner college (University of Rochester, University of Wisconsin-Madison, Bucknell University, Sewanee: The University of the South, & Lafayette College). - 16. <u>American Indian College Fund</u> May 31, 2020 Open to students with 2.0+ GPA who are enrolled members of a federal or state recognized tribe
- 17. <u>Foot Locker Scholarship</u> May 29, 2020- \$5,000 scholarship open to high school seniors and current college students with 3.0+ GPA provided they are attending one of the <u>37</u> UNCF member colleges or universities
- 18. <u>CNO Naval History Scholarship</u> May 31, 2020 \$5,000, \$2,500 and \$1,500 essay contest on a lesson learned from naval history that can be applied today
- 19. <u>Mary Blackwell Barnes Scholarship</u> May 31, 2020 Open to female students who are rising sophomores to graduate level status, at VA or DC colleges and who display interest in the field of public finance

June

- 1. <u>Joe Francis Haircare Scholarship</u> June 1, 2020 \$1,200 scholarship open to students applying to or currently enrolled in cosmetology or barbering schools
- 2. <u>American Indian Nurse Scholarship</u> June 1, 2020 Candidate must be at least 1/4 American Indian and enrolled in a nursing program; \$3,000 per year renewable scholarship
- 3. <u>Fundera</u> June 1, 2020 \$2,000 award per semester (Fall semester deadline June 1, 2020 and Spring semester deadline Jan 1, 2021.) entrepreneurial video/social media contest open to high school seniors and current college students.
- 4. <u>Prism Foundation (formerly GAPA foundation)</u> June 7, 2020 \$1,000 to 5,000 scholarship open to high school seniors and current college students who have history of activism within either the API and/or LGBTQ communities
- 5. <u>A&F Scholarship</u> June 12, 2020 \$1,000 scholarship open to high school juniors and seniors as well as current college students; essay on career and life goals

- 6. <u>Narrative Prize</u> June 15, 2020- \$4,000 prize awarded for the best short story, novel excerpt, poem, one-act play, graphic story, or work of literary nonfiction published *Narrative*
- 7. <u>American Muscle Automotive Student Scholarship</u> June 15, 2020 (and October 15 deadline for spring semester)- \$2,000 scholarship open to high school seniors and current college students pursuing an automotive themed major
- 8. <u>Big Sun Athletic Scholarship</u> June 19, 2020 \$500 scholarship open to high school seniors who are student athletes
- 9. <u>Providian Medical Scholarship</u> June 21, 2020 (and January 15, 20201 for the Spring semester) Essay contest on medical technology; \$500 scholarship open to current college students and high school seniors with 3.0+ GPA
- 10. Ethiopian Heritage Scholarship June 26, 2020 \$1,000 renewable local scholarship. The Chaikin, Sherman, Cammarata & Siegel, P.C.
